

BACKGROUND

The Tŝilhqot'in Nation has always practiced our right to self-government. As part of this journey, the Tŝilhqot'in Nation has been working since 2020 to reclaim child and family services. This work is called "Tŝilhqot'in Nidlin" - translating to "we are Tŝilhqot'in" - to encompass past, present, and future generations.

The Nidlin Team has been busy working with community members, frontline workers, Leadership, and government partners to develop our Legislation, Service Model, and Jurisdiction agreement. This newsletter provides an update on our engagement and progress to date.



The work this team is doing is not just for future generations, but it's also work to heal the generations before us. It's needed work.




ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

As of March 2024, the Tŝilhqot'in team has engaged with at least **292 COMMUNITY MEMBERS** at over **87 EVENTS**, as shown below:



We have held events in all 6 COMMUNITIES, as well as in Williams Lake:



Completed Engagement Phases:

Our engagement phases have focused on the following:

PHASE 1 (2020 - 2022)

- Introducing Engagement Coordinators to communities
- Gathering and sharing information related to children and families
- Learning about Tŝilhqot'in protocols and laws

PHASE 3 (OCT - NOV 2023)

- Sharing back Phase 2 results
- Gathering ideas on service model
- Identifying key roles and responsibilities
- Understanding the importance of our Legislation and developing its content

Upcoming Engagement:

PHASE 5 (MAR - APR 2024)

- Sharing back Phase 4 results
- Gathering feedback and answering questions about our transition to Jurisdiction
- Discussing governance structures

PHASE 2 (JUL - SEPT 2023)

- Sharing back Phase 1 results
- Understanding current strengths and challenges
- Discussing sample scenarios related to child wellness
- Deciding new words for our Tŝilhqot'in model

PHASE 4 (DEC 2023 - FEB 2024)

ENGAGEMENT HIGHLIGHTS

WHAT WE HEARD FROM COMMUNITY

Legislation

Our legislation is titled *Tŝilhqot'in ?Esqax Sutsel Jeniyax.* This translates to "Tŝilhqot'in children growing up in a good way."

We presented highlights from the draft Legislation during engagements, and Community Members provided feedback including:

- Importance of matriarchs
- Need for a Tribunal to handle disputes
- Need for communities to work together for our children
- Need for power to be shared, not held with one decisionmaking body.




Emerging Service Model

Our collaborative service model allows us to move services from a central Tŝilhqot'in Organization to communities

as capacity grows. This will help ensure children do not fall through the cracks.

Community Members provided key feedback about our Service Model:

- Supportive of this model that allows us to build tools and capacity in communities
- Importance of working collaboratively to build community ownership of services
- We need to ensure off-reserve children and families are included in our service model.



FRONTLINE WORKERS ENGAGEMENT

On January 16, 2024, frontline workers from Denisiqi Services Society and Tŝilhqot'in communities gathered in Williams Lake to learn about our work towards jurisdiction.

Frontline workers provided valuable feedback, including:

- We need strong coordination, communication, and governance
- We need clear processes and standards to implement our Legislation

They also identified key questions about our Service Model, which are guiding our next steps for transition planning.

TŜILHQOT'IN LEADERSHIP FORUM

On February 22, 2024, Tŝilhqot'in Chiefs, Councils, and Women's Council attended a Leadership Forum. Over **55 PEOPLE** from **ALL 6 COMMUNITIES** attended to hear updates and provide direction on child and family jurisdiction.



We're definitely on the right track. The amount of work that's been done on this is a lot more than I had anticipated.

It's been a while since we had Council all together with the Chiefs in one room. It's a pretty powerful room right now.



DR. CINDY BLACKSTOCK KEYNOTE & HONOURING

On February 23, 2024, Frontline workers, Chiefs, Councils, and Women's Council were invited to learn from Dr. Cindy Blackstock, a Gitxsan activist for child welfare and Executive Director of the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada. Dr. Blackstock provided a keynote address, followed by discussion, ceremony, and a shared meal.





Ambearrister Honouring

Dr. Blackstock honoured the Tŝilhqot'in Nation with an Ambearrister (ambassador + barrister) to witness and support our work towards Child and Family Jurisdiction. The Ambearrister is a friend of Spirit Bear, who witnesses all Canadian Human Rights Tribunal hearings on behalf of Indigenous children.

Our Ambearrister will be present for all discussions related to our Child and Family Jurisdiction.

TRANSITIONING TO JURISDICTION

WHERE TWO RIVERS MEET

?Atish ?Elhixidlin is a special site within Tŝilhqot'in Title Lands where the Dasiqox and Tŝilhqox rivers meet. With a swift current at the junction, the two different colours of water run alongside each other, gradually mixing to become one.

Our transition to Tŝilhqot'in Jurisdiction can be imagined like two streams - Tŝilhqot'in and Provincial Jurisdiction - flowing beside each other and gradually merging to build towards full Tŝilhqot'in Jurisdiction (see Page 9).



BENEFITS FOR COMMUNITIES

We are strongly advocating to bring positive changes to Tŝilhqot'in communities through Jurisdiction, including:



Requesting funding to **get ready** for Jurisdiction (training staff, creating policies, etc.)



Following guidance from **Dechen Ts'edilhtan** (Tŝilhqot'in Law) to improve programs



Staying safe from **legal risks** until we have the tools to protect us



Advocating for more funding for **prevention services**, with new supports for off-reserve families



Calling for more resources to create **buildings and spaces** for services

Denisiqi will continue to improve services under Provincial Jurisdiction by:

- Providing more services in our own way
- Following community direction
- Integrating Dechen Ts'edilhtan (Tŝilhqot'in Law) into everything we do.

After five years, the two jurisdiction streams will merge. We will practice full Jurisdiction using Tŝilhqot'in law and policies.


STREAMS MERGE AS WE PRACTICE FULL JURISDICTION (YEAR 6)





EMERGING GOVERNANCE BODIES

During the first five years of jurisdiction, we will set up strong governance structures at the community and Nation level. This will make decision-making clear and accountable.



A board of community experts will govern the central Tŝilhqot'in Organization and provide funding to communities



An independent panel to resolve disputes and make decisions, eventually replacing provincial courts



Communities will decide their own governance structures based on capacity and community direction



Respected Aunts and Uncles will provide advice based on Tŝilhqot'in values and culture

During the next phase of engagement, the Nidlin team will focus on:

- Building community understanding and support for our transition to full jurisdiction
- Gathering feedback about putting our new service model into action
- Discussing community and Nation-level governance structures
